My beekeeping

- Started in 1963
- Practical beekeeper
- Travelled widely seen a lot of different...
 - Bees
 - Beekeepers and BKAs
 - Local conditions
- Know some of beekeeping's problems
- They are people not bees!

Is it possible?

UK had10,000 years without imports

- Still closed populations
- Yes, so no argument
- We may be without imports in the future

EU Queen Imports into UK

- 2017 (17,005)
- 2016 15,748
- 2015 13,068
- 2014 11,774
- 2013 11,385
- 2012 8,259
- 2011 (4,568)
- How many imported illegally?

- 525

Why do we have imports?

- Reasons often given......
- Increase genetic diversity
- Need queens early in the season
- Negative comments about native/near native bees need something better
- Commercial interests
- More prolific
- Make up winter losses
- Higher yields
- Let's look at them.....

Increase genetic diversity

- Do individuals really import queens for that reason?
- Around 250,000 colonies in England and Wales!
- Official queen imports <20,000 P/A
- How many are bred from in large numbers?
- 100 or less?
- •**∕**Own goal?

Queens early in the season

Why?

- Change management
- I want, I want and I want it now

Overwinter queens/colonies

Commercial interests

- Happening for 100+ years in UK
- Heavy advertising
- Some may be dubious
- Short term gain warning
 - Sell what people want
- People in influential places selling/promoting imported queens
 - BKA officials?
 - Teachers?
 - Bee Inspectors?

Prolific.....

- Breed year round varroa?
- Need much more food cost and work
- Pressure on forage
- City beekeepers

• Starvation – summer and winter?

Make up winter losses

- Why do we have losses?
- Can't survive winters?
- Starvation?

 Why replace bees that don't survive winters with more stock that don't survive winters?

Put more colonies into winter

Lets look at productivity.....

- Nybrid vigour unsustainable
- Beginners luck
- Good robbers
- Condition of colony
- May have swarmed
- Management
- On the end of a line
- Number of patrilines
- All variables
- Bees aren't lazy
 - -unless they are Italians!

Why do we have imports?

Other reasons

- Greed/selfishness
- Lack of knowledge
- Grass is greener
- Just to try them

What are the objections


- Possibly unsuited to conditions
- Possible introduction of pests/disease
- Possible aggression

- Feeder inside

- Carniolan


- "Buckfast"

- They vary just see photos
- Native Amm x Italian?
- Italian x Carniolan?
- Mixture?
- Hybrids or mongrels?
- Is there genetic stability?
- Do beekeepers know what they are buying?
- Supporters are often very defensive......
-so can second generation "Buckfast"!

- An admission they can be aggressive?
- What if one "Buckfast" is crossed with another "Buckfast"?
- Buy more unsustainable!

 We buy the best quality Buckfast pure-bred queens and breed from those in an open mating situation.

....even more

- We buy the best quality Buckfast pure-bred queens and breed from those in an open mating situation.
- We flood our mating apiaries with pure bred Buckfast drones but cannot guarantee pure Buckfast bees as a result. Our queens are first generation and broadly speaking that makes them at worst F1 mated queens. We never let our queens become F2 as that would generate impure drones and be closer to the more unpleasant characteristics of the hybridised form.

 "....it is our goal to maintain a healthy and self-sustaining population of Buckfast bees"

- Beginners teaching beginners

 BBKA 23.8lb per beekeeper! Why? I averaged over 100lb in a middling district.

- Assumption that people with qualifications are better
- Same information for different parts of the country
- Large importations 1963 and shiela berrett

- Inexperience people becoming bee farmers
- Chap in preston going to build up to 150 colonies by end of next year
- Steve bees 15 miles away
- Courses with people from Dorset,
 Aberdeen, Derbyshire, South Wales,
 Jersey. Man kept bees in New zealand.
 Told them their situations will all be different

- I want bees advert in magazine winter losses
- Scientists, bee farmers amateurs working together
- Bees online website. No mention of what kind of bees
- Encourage beekeepers to have good bees so we have good drones
- Frightened of killing queens

What are we dealing with?

Two species of beekeeper

Commercial >10 colonies

Amateur <10 colonies

Commercial

Several sub – species

- Part time full time job or augmenting income/pension
- Living for one person/family
- Larger employing staff
- Some may not have great knowledge or experience

Commercial

- Past beekeepers used mainly native/near native bees
- They produced large crops
- Raised queens
- Had good management skills
- Some still do
- W.W. Smith made a living from about 120 colonies in Scottish borders

<u>Amateur</u>

Also several sub-species

- Let alone
- Love fluffy animals, saving bees, etc
- Incapable of learning
- Never get above a certain level
- Partly understand "basics" and no more
- Good sound progressive beekeepers

Amateur - excuses

- Small number of colonies
- Little to compare with
- Lack experience
- Often abandoned
- Need sound practical guidance and teaching

<u>But....</u>

- They all have bees
- They all have flying drones
- They all add to the mix

Are they <u>all</u> sustainable?

Let's help them

My own bees

- Not used imported queens for over 50 years
- Selected from local stocknear-native
- Single brood National summer and winter

- Autumn 2016 averaged 1kg sugar/colony
- Spring 2017 no feeding moved food combs
- Averaged just over 100lbs/colony
- Lost 1 colony from 25 queen problem
- That's sustainable

Beekeepers are taught standard twaddle.....

Old chestnuts about "black bees"

- Wiped out by Isle of Wight Disease
- Susceptible to disease acarine
- Small colonies
- Bad tempered
- Chase you up the garden path
- Etc, etc
- British Black bees are extinct

.....and bees in general

- Queen lays 3000+ eggs a day
- 60,000 bees in a colony
- Colonies must be strong with large patches of brood
- Queens must be large
- Requeen regularly
- Single B.S. brood not large enough
- Feed, feed, feed, mentality
- NBU email advice feed during summer
- Raise queens from the best colonies
- Mollycoddle bees
- Mainly relevant to imports......

Why do these perpetuate?

- Cut and pasted
- With no reply

- Let's answer them head on
- We all sit back and laugh
- It's our fault!

BBKA Exam System

- "Basic" 97-98% pass rate
- Modules.....
 - Same questions repeated
 - Some questions inappropriate
 - Anything about avoiding imports?
 - Taught how to pass
- Does it improve beekeeping?
- Is it fit for purpose?
- Does it need a review?

Challenge to Bee Farmers

- Think about the total operation
- Not individual colonies
- See if the profit improves by:-
- Having more smaller colonies?
- Reduced feeding and time taken?
- More honey to sell rather than bees turning it into brood they don't need?
- Might need to change management and culture

<u>NBU</u>

- Concerned with disease
- Do they discourage imports?
- What bees do they have?
- Many comments about Bee Inspectors
- Now many complaints are made?
- Tuition for Bee Inspectors?
- Information on how to import bees
- Little on the dangers of doing so

BIBBA

- Were ineffective for some time
- Politics and personalities
- Changing
- Rapid improvement in last 3-4 years
 - Breeding groups
 - Scientific/technical committee
 - Bee Improvement (BIFA) Days
 - 1 & 2 day Bee Improvement courses
 - Instrumental insemination courses
 - Open Days
 - Conferences
 - Website
 - Isolated mating sites
- Still more to do
- We need help.....

My experience.....

- Good summer prolific will probably do better
- Poor summer non-prolific do better

- Take feeding into account
 - Non-prolific better over time
- Give crop in poor season usually
